

FOOTBALL FIESTA AT THE S.C.G.

The annual match between two Victorian Football League teams at the Sydney Cricket Ground is now established as an important date on Sydney's sporting calendar.

In 1965, after a wet morning 22,378 fans turned out to see Geelong defeat South Melbourne. In 1966, 14,308 braved torrential rain to witness Essendon down Haw-thorn, and last year, in fine weather, but despite strong opposition on the adjacent Showground, 23,777 patrons were loud in their applause of the fine display of the players when Essendon defeated Geelong.

Today we proudly submit two of the current leading V.F.L. teams, Carlton and St. Kilda, with their large bands of supporters, many of whom will be in attendance barracking for their idols. "Mr. Football", Ron Barassi, is Captain of the Blues whilst the Saints are led by the illustrious Darrell Baldock.

Whilst it is not possible at this time, and unlikely in the foreseeable future, to present to Sydney fans a full-blooded V.F.L. Premiership Competition match, the teams today will be competing for a \$1,000 cash award, which will invest the game in a competitive spirit.

Sydney folk will recall the T.V. replays of the 1966 V.F.L. Grand Final when St. Kilda, in one of the most sensational V.F.L. final matches, won their first ever Premiership Pennant from Collingwood by one point.

Carlton have eight premierships to their credit, the last in 1947, and both teams are bent on adding the 1968 Flag to their record—St. Kilda at present on top of the competition table and Carlton running fourth.

The teams met twice last year, with Carlton winning narrowly on each occasion-11.14 to 11.9 and 11.7 to 9.8.

They are scheduled to meet only once this year in the home and away matches, i.e. on June 22 at Moorabbin. Therefore, their initial clash for 1968, at the S.C.G., will hold considerable interest and will be a morale booster to the winner.

Since 1964 the clubs have monopolised the Brownlow Medal awards for Best and Fairest player. In that year Gordon Collis of Carlton was the winner whilst St. Kilda has had the honour since—Ian Stewart 1965-1966 and Ross Smith 1967.

N.S.W. FOOTBALL ON TRIAL

Roger Hoggett, former Carlton player and Captain-Coach of the Western Suburbs Club, was appointed State Coach last year and, also as captain of the N.S.W. side, met with a win over Queensland in the S.C.G. curtain-raiser.

With the Australian National Football Council Section 2 Championship set down for Canberra over the Queen's Birthday week-end, it was not practicable to arrange a match against Queensland today, and local administrators have gambled high in tackling a Victorian 2nd 18, as most of their players have V.F.L. first grade experience, whilst others are being groomed for that purpose. The team is coached by Graham Donaldson, former Carlton follower and V.F.L. representative.

Whatever the result the match will serve as a tremendous workout for the Championship matches next week-end, the programme being:


Attached to their party are 27 Umpires from the V.F.L. Reserves off duty, but intent on viewing today's matches and sampling Sydney's hospitality.

This 6 foot 13 stone ruckman from the Eastern Suburbs Club is destined for a distinguished football career.

In the St. Kilda teams are Gary Colling 18 $6.1\frac{1}{2}$ 12.7, schoolboy; Jim O'Dea 19 6.1 12.10; Allan Davis 19, $5.1\frac{1}{2}$, 12.12, who played in the 1966 Premiership side at 17 years of age whilst attending school and Stephen Roberts 19 6.3 13.7 who was included in the list when only 16 years of age.

Carlton have two 17 year olders in Brent Croswell 6.1 12.5 and Robert Walls 6.3 12.8, also Robert Edmond 19 years 6.2, 13.0.

Many claims are made as to youngest player ever to play League football in Victoria, but here are some of the youngest:-

Mick Maguire, 15 years 2 months, when he played with Richmond in 1909.



ALLAN JEANS. Coach

Allan is in his eighth season as nonplaying Coach and is the most successful in the Club's history. In his first season in 1961 he took the team into Final Four for the first time in 22 years The Saints finished fourth, a position they filled again in 1963. Then in 1965 Allan led the side into a Grand Finaltheir first since 1913-only to be defeated by Essendon. The following year, however, St. Kilda won its firstever premiership flag, and Allan Jeans was a guiding light behind the onepoint Grand Final victory over Collingwood.

DARREL BALDOCK

Captain. "Doc" is one of the best-known footballers in Australia. He has captained Saints since 1963, and has played over 100 games. He was Club best and fairest in 1962 (his first year), 1963 and 1965 Before transferring to St. Kilda, Darrel captained Tasmania at 21 years of age — their youngest ever. He captained Victoria in 1967 and

was acting captain of

the 1966 Carnival side. At the end of the ANFC Championships in Hobart, Darrel was named captain of the All-Australian team.

VERDUN HOWELL, Vice-Captain

Verdun came from Tasmania in 1958. and has played over 160 games and represented Victoria several times. In 1959 he tied for the Brownlow Medal but lost on a count-back to Bob Skilton (South Melbourne). In the same season Verdun was adjudged Club best and fairest.

KEVIN BILLING

Kevin is a talented footballer who has played in many positions with the Saints. He made his League debut at 17 years of age after winning his way through from the Under 19's. He was 20th man in the 1966 premiership side.

JOHN BONNEY

John was an outstanding player in Tasmania before switching to St. Kilda in 1967. Business commitments forced John to return to Tasmania but typical of this player's dedication he travels each week from Burnie to play with the Saints.

JON LILLEY



LAWS OF THE AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL GAME OF FOOTBALL es with four quarters of 25 minutes each. (5) Tackling is different to any other

(1) The game is played over 100 minutes, with four quarters of 25 minutes each. One important aspect is that the action flows all the time. There are no stoppages, not even for injury, and trainers are permitted on the field at all time to attend injured players.

(2) Scoring is done by registering goals or behinds, and the side with the greater number of points wins the match. If the points scored are equal the match is drawn.

A goal is scored when the ball is kicked between the two tall inner posts by a player of the attacking side without touching a player or a goal post, and a behind is scored in any other case when the ball passes over the goal line, or through the outer posts. A goal shall count six points and a behind one point. The Goal Umpire signals a goal by waving two flags and the game is recommenced by the Field Umpire bouncing the ball in the centre. A behind is signalled by one flag and the game recommenced by a player of the defending side kicking off from the kick-off line. In each instance, time off is recorded from the time the Goal Umpire signals the score and the game is recommenced.

(3) There is no off-side and the ball may be kicked or passed forward or back-ward at will.

(4) There is no knock-on penalty. The legal way of passing the ball is by hand punching. Throwing is illegal and brings a free kick to the opposing team.

(5) Tackling is different to any other code. A player in possession of the ball may be met fairly by an opponent and brought down by the use of the hip, shoulder or chest and he may be pushed on the side or in the chest with the open palms. A man in possession when tackled or held fairly must immediately get rid of the ball. If he fails to do so it is known as "holding the ball" and entitles the opposing side to a free

kick. Tackling or holding below the hips or above the shoulders is not allowed. Tackling or holding the man who is not in possession of the ball is not allowed.

(6) A player in possession must not run for more than 10 yards without bouncing the ball. However, long runs are few and far between and good players would rather gain ground by kicking to a team mate.

(7) Kicking out of bounds deliberately can be penalised. If the field umpire is of the opinion the ball was kicked out deliberately he can award a free kick to the opposing team. This is to keep the game flowing.

(8) Players are not sent off the field for ground offences. The Field Umpire reports the player after the game and his case is then heard by the Judiciary Committee.

(9) There are 18 players on each side with a 19th and 20th man who can replace any player, injured or otherwise, at any time during the match.

The 36 players are given set positions at the start of the match, but there could be many changes in position before the game is concluded. This is particularly the case if one player is being consistently beaten by his opposite number.
